Psalm 62:8 Trust in him at all times, O people: pour out your heart to him, for God is our refuge.

Henri Nouwen says it eloquently, "This experience of God's acceptance frees us from our needy self and thus creates new space where we can pay selfless attention to others."

Wednesday, July 31st Judges 3:12-30 / Psalm 72 / Acts 1:1-14 / Matthew 27:45-54 (written by Denise)

Matthew 27:51 At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook and the rocks split.

We finished our Bible study of Matthew not too long ago. This scripture had a big impact on me, when it was explained. I never thought much about the curtain of the temple being torn. This is one of those puzzle pieces that

just makes me see how much I have to learn and how the Old Testament has so much significance. The curtain in the temple was between the Holy Place and the Most Holy Place. The Priest performed duties in the Holy Place, but only the High Priest could go into the Most Holy Place, and only once a year to offer a sacrifice. God's presence was in the Most Holy Place. The significance of the curtain of the temple being torn when Jesus died is that the barrier between us and God is gone. Jesus made the final sacrifice for us, and through him we can go boldly and courageously right into God's presence. I have no words for how amazing this is!
